IT CENTRE

The organization runs an IT Centre to train adolescents and young adults from minority communities and poorer households in the use of Information Technology. It provides them with a diploma and certificate courses. They are taught and trained to use various computer application software like Excel, Word, Tally for accounting, among others. The students take up jobs as typists, call centre personnel, and tally accountants.



The jobs facilitate the students in supporting their households and further education. The jobs provide the girls with financial independence. Many of the girls at the organization use it as a means to negotiate with the patriarchal attitudes in their homes.

The course offered is Diploma in Computer Application, Business Accounting and Multilingual DTP (CABA-MDTP). After which, the students receive a joint Certificate by NCPUL & NIELIT Chandigarh, approved by NSDA (level-4), Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship, Govt. of India. The organization also offers NIELIT Certificate Course on Computer Concepts – CCC.



The IT centre also offers a 'Diploma in Urdu Language,' which is mandatory to receive the Diploma in CABA-MDTP.

ADOLESCENT AWARENESS AND EMPOWERMENT WORKSHOPS

Education & Health for all

CFHRSW has been working for health, education, family planning, RCH, problems of adolescents, human rights, women's issues, 'Communal Harmony' and awareness among homeless people, poor minorities and Dalits. CHRSW has been very keen on empowerment of women, especially the homeless woman and Muslim women of conservative and poor families. Women are made aware of their rights and laws relating to them.

Victims of domestic violence and other kinds of injustices are helped and supported counseling is also done for such victims. Mohalla Meetings are organized for awareness programs. We are also trying to get women involved in income generation activities. For encouraging income generation activities among women we are in the process of organizing multiple training programs on the making of bamboo and jute handicrafts.


Working for and with the youth, we have formed 42 'youth forums' in five districts (Jaipur, Tonk, Jhunjhunu, Sikar and Churu) of Rajasthan. Since 2012, plenty meetings and workshops with the youth have been organized to discuss reproductive health, RTI, STD, HIV/AIDS, ill effects of early marriage and early motherhood, drug and alcohol addiction. Young people have participated in rallies on various subjects. Organization has been motivating them to free themselves from prejudices based castism. regionalism and communalisms Thev have also counseled and guided on various issues including employment.

We tell them that birth control is not against Islam. Similarly talking about ill against Islam. Similarly talking about ill effects of the "child marriage" on the effects of the "child marriage" we tell health and future of children. We tell them that in Islam consent of bride is them that in Islam consent of bride is essential for marriage. So if the bride is essential for marriage how can she give a child who doesn't understand full meaning of marriage how can she give a make them valid consent. Thus we make them valid consent. Thus we birth control understand that neither birth control understand after childhood are anti-Islam.

CFHRSW organizes workshops regularly to generate awareness among its students about the differential treatment of girls in households, such as gender roles, differences in educational opportunities, differences in resource allocation, restrictions on mobility, violence against women, and early marriage of women. The workshop aims to sensitize teenagers towards the patriarchal attitudes existing in society and teach them to negotiate with them and act against them.

Promoting Communal Harmony

The computer centre is aimed at training and developing skills among teenagers from minority communities. CFHRSW enrolls students from majority communities in the course too. The objective is to initiate a dialogue between the teenagers and young adults of the different communities. We promote the sensitization of the majority community towards the exploitation and rights of the minority community. The centre is located inside the premises of the Auliya Masjid, which in itself acts as a gateway for the majority community in the minority community space. The entire process is used as a tool to promote communal harmony, one of the organization's primary goals.





CFHRSW with the Ministry of Minority Affairs, Government of India organizes a six-day workshop under its Nai Roshani Project. The workshop aims to empower women through various activities such as games, role-playing, group dialogues, case studies, illustrations, and question-answer rounds to develop leadership skills. The six-day workshop focuses on gender discrimination, gender policy, budget, health and hygiene, the importance of education, financial literacy, Swachh Bharat Mission and gender advocacy, etc. The workshop educates women about their Islamic and legal rights too. Additionally, the workshop also includes a session on digital literacy.

CFHRSW also facilitates the **formation of self-help groups** for its participants. These groups take **small entrepreneurship initiatives** such as the production of handicrafts and other handmadeproducts. The final goods are sold in the marketor to the organization whichplaces bulk orders for them. The initiative not only develops leadership skills in the women but also **helps them attain financial independence**.





BAMBOO & JUTE HANDICRAFTS



Bamboo wipes are made by 250 women at various places in Churu, Jhunjhunu and Jaipur.

Bamboo wipes are made for **baby care**, **hand washing**, feminine and other **personal cleansing**, removing makeup, and applying products such as deodorants and sunless tanners, among other uses.

They are proposed as a **hygiene tool** (bacteria & amp; fungal free) for cleaning baby's skin, especially in the peri-anal area post defecation. These wipes are practiced as they are impregnate with lotions or other natural active elements, which also plays a role of **sanitizer** and **medicinal** equipment.

The making of bamboo wipes enable to cut less trees and to protect more the environment.

Women enrolled also receive a training on leadership and can learn to make jute handicrafts as well.







Our organization ran a campaign to save water in Rajasthan with a **group** of 150 women. The NGO was willing to explain the importance of water to the people of the Muslim community in the light of Quran and Hadith. The aimed was to **connect people in Jaipur and surrounding areas** through this campaign.

The CFHRSW trained 150 women who splitted in small groups to raise awareness in the community about ways to save water, including for example how the water used during ablution can be reused.

Due to the efforts of the social volunteers, water recycling has been implemented in many mosques.

This campaign enabled to take measures in order to save Rajasthani people from the huge shortage of water in the future.
